The children will also get to play and catch up with their schoolwork whilst living in a safe place.

help people of different

respect each other more fully

Aid to the Church in Need has helped build a new Catholic hospital in war-torn Iraq. This will help to bring the community together and give people access to good healthcare

Religious leaders of different faiths support #RedWednesday including: Cardinal Vincent Nichols; the Patriarch of the Syriac Orthodox Church, Ignatius Aphrem II; Dr Sarah Bernstein, director-general of the Jerusalem Centre for Jewish-Christian Relations in Israel; and Shaykh Dr Umar Al-Qadri Ameer, head-imam of the Al-Mustafa Islamic Educational & Cultural Centre in Ireland.

On Easter Sunday 2016, a bomb exploded in a park in Lahore, Pakistan. The Taliban claimed responsibility, saying they targeted Christians--69 people were killed

-6 Freedom Points

In Eritrea, followers of
Jesus have faced
beatings and
imprisonment

-3 Freedom Points

Over 240 million
Christians worldwide
face persecution simply
for following Jesus

-5 Freedom Points

Leaving Islam is
forbidden in Yemen

-3 Freedom Points

The largest religious minority in Iran, the Baha'i community suffers extreme persecution and is denied many rights.

-2 Freedom Points

In 2018 477 anti-Christian incidents occurred in India.

Another 117 have been recorded there in the first three months of this year.

-3 Freedom Points

India still has a strict caste system that orders society. Many Christians come from the poorest caste, the dalits or untouchables. They are not liked by others in higher up, more respectable castes

-2 Freedom Points

Leah was kidnapped because she is a girl.

She remains in captivity because she's a Christian. In February 2018, 15 year-old Leah

Sharibu was taken from her school in Nigeria, along with over 100 other girls by gunmen from an extremist group. After a month the girls who were still alive were released, all except one. Leah.

-4 Freedom Points

Attacks on Christians in Nigeria are growing in ferocity and frequency - according to a priest who works with survivors of extremist violence

-4 Freedom Points

In Nigeria, Aid to the Church in Need is supporting projects including help for families left destitute and the rebuilding of church-run welfare support programmes destroyed by extremists

+2 Freedom Points

Reported attacks on
Christians in India have
increased by more
than 400% since 2014

-4 Freedom Points

Because of the war, more than
12 million Syrians have lost
their lives or fled their homes.

In January-February 2018 alone, it was reported that 1,000 Syrian children were hurt or killed in the war.

Christians are in the
minority and treated as
second class citizens in
Pakistan

-2 Freedom Points

It is illegal to take
Arabic Bibles into Libya
or to share the Gospel

-2 Freedom Points

If you are even suspected of being
a Christian in Somalia, you could
be murdered on the spot

-4 Freedom Points

In Afghanistan,
Baptism is a crime
punishable by death

-4 Freedom Points

In Afghanistan, there are no public churches. Praying, singing or possessing Christian materials can be very dangerous

-2 Freedom Points

In North Korea, where Bibles are not permitted, some people literally bury them in the ground to avoid detection.

-3 Freedom Points

In North Korea,
owning a bible can get
you arrested.

-3 Freedom Points

North Korea is the most dangerous place in the world to be a Christian.

Christians face arrest, torture, imprisonment and death for daring to believe there is a higher authority than the nation's leader, Kim Jong-un.

-6 Freedom Points

In Burma (Myanmar), thousands of Rohingya (a Muslim ethnic group practising a form of Sunni Islam) were attacked and forced to leave their homes in 2017.

-3 Freedom Points

There has recently been
some violence against Jews
in France and Belgium

-3 Freedom Points

In China, large numbers of Muslims and Christians (perhaps millions) have been imprisoned for their faith.
