

We've made every effort to keep things simple with clear instructions and materials that should be readily available in your home or classroom.

Chapter 51:

In today's chapter, Jesus disappears. Mary and Joseph search everywhere for nearly three whole days before they find him. He's in the Temple talking with the priests and teachers.

It's a scary feeling...

when we get lost or separated from the people we're with. One minute we're all there together in a group — talking or laughing or looking around — and the next minute everyone has disappeared. It suddenly doesn't seem very fun any more.



Have you ever been lost or separated from your family or friends when you were out somewhere? How did you feel?

Who helped you find your way back? What happened when you returned? How did your parents or the adults with you react?

It was probably pretty frightening for you at the time. You may have been upset or nervous. When you found your way back, you likely felt very happy and relieved.

The other people—your family or friends—might have seemed cross and maybe they even told you off for getting lost. They weren't really angry, though; they were probably just scared and worried when they couldn't find you.

This is how Mary and Joseph must have felt when Jesus disappeared. They were visiting a big, unfamiliar place with lots of people they didn't know. Jesus was only twelve and it took Mary and Joseph almost three whole days to find him. When Mary tells him how worried she and Joseph were, Jesus explains that he was in his Father's house (the temple), but he also realises that, just like you, he was young and still needed people—his parents, for instance—to look after him. After that, he went back home and tried his best not to worry his mother or Joseph.

Who are the people who look after you? Jesus didn't want to worry or frighten the people who loved him. Can you be like Jesus?



Prayer for today: Today we say thank you for all those who care for us. Thank you, God, for placing people in our lives to love and support us.






Chapter 52:

In today's chapter we hear about John the Baptist, cousin of Jesus, as he prepares the way for the coming of the Messiah. You can watch today's video here > https://

The Messiah is a very famous piece of music. It was written nearly 300 years ago by a man called George Friedrich Handel. The Messiah tells the story of Jesus in three parts. The first part covers the events leading up to the first Christmas and the early life of Jesus. The other parts cover the Passion, Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus and his promise to us of eternal life in heaven. Watch the video clip below and listen carefully to the words. Do you recognise them? They are very close to part of today's chapter. What do you think about this kind of singing? Can you recognise any of the instruments being played? The singer must be able to sing very loudly to be heard above all of the other instruments! Can you

The most famous part of the Messiah is the Hallelujah Chorus from the end of the second section. A special recording was made by the Royal Choral Society on Good Friday 2020. All of the singers were stuck at home because of the coronavirus lockdown, so they couldn't sing together on a stage—instead they all sang their parts at home to create a virtual choir for their

In the video for this chapter, Bishop Terry has asked you to find out about your baptism. If you haven't been baptised, you could find out more about the day you were born or, if you belong to another faith, you could ask about how your faith community

Here's a starter list of question you might want to ask, but feel free to add more!

welcomed you into the world.

- 1. Who was the priest who baptised you? Who were your godparents or sponsors? Who else was there to watch?
- 2. What happened at your baptism? What special clothes did you wear? What did your family do to mark the day?
- 3. Where were you baptised? Where in church was the baptismal font?
- 4. When were you baptised? In the morning or afternoon? What was the weather like? How old were you?
- 5. Why did your parents or guardian want you to be baptised? Why did you wear special clothes? Why did the priest pour water over you and anoint you?

Here are some suggestions for finding your answers:

- Ask people who were there about what they remember— your parents, older brothers and sisters, grandparents, aunts and uncles, cousins or family friends.
- Look for photos to find out who was there and what you were wearing.
- If you still live nearby, you could ask an adult to take you to visit the church where you were baptised.

Today's story is short, but action-packed. Just the sort of thing for today's activity....

Let's make a Story Board!



This is going to be easy and fun. You can do it in just three steps.

- 1. Listen to the story again and make a list of the people who appear and any 'props' you'll need to tell the story in your own words.
- 2. Take a piece of A4 paper and turn it so that a long side is at the top. Then draw or paint your background: a light brown or yellow strip at the bottom for the shore, a blue strip in the middle for the water and a light blue strip at the top for the sky. Next add in some details: the sun, some clouds, a few palm trees or whatever you like.
- 3. (This bit is really fun!) Figure out which characters and props you need for each scene and how big you want them to be. Draw them on another piece of paper and cut them out. Colour them in or decorate them and add their names.

That's it! To use your story board, you can set up each scene and take a picture of it (maybe you can ask to borrow a phone to do this) OR you can 'perform' the story to someone else by placing the figures for each scene on the background. Don't forget to use different voices for each character!

God Speaks to his Children, the ACN Child's Bible, is sometimes the only book a child will ever own. It has been used since its release in 1979 to teach children about their Christian faith and to provide an invaluable literacy tool as well!. To date, over 51 million copies in 190 languages have gone out around the world. The edition in Spanish is the most popular (around 14 million copies printed), with Portuguese not far behind (10.3 million). English (2.5 million), French (1.2 million) and Swahili (950,000) are the next most popular languages.

From the very beginning, ACN has distributed *God Speaks to his Children* to struggling Christian communities free of charge. For every copy sold in the UK, 3 more copies will be sent out to children elsewhere for free.
