








Where your help went:

(Projects funded by all 23 of ACN's national offices)



1,315 Building projects

A good third of all our construction projects were in the Middle East and involved the rebuilding and repair of churches, religious houses, pastoral centres and family homes for the returning Christian refugees. Most of the other projects for churches, religious houses and retreat centres that we supported were in Africa.

• 1,378,635 Mass Offerings

Almost 1.4 million Masses – that means that Holy Mass was celebrated approximately every 23 seconds somewhere in the world for the intentions of our benefactors. At the same time, we were able to help roughly 1 in 10 of the 414,582 Catholic priests around the world. Around 38% of these Mass offerings went to the Church in Africa.

• 16,206 Seminarians supported

Altogether there are 115,382 Catholic seminarians around the world. One in seven of them receives support from ACN: the majority of these are in Africa (8,039), followed by Latin America (3,061) and Eastern Europe (3,254). Once again, this year particular emphasis was laid on formation and growth in maturity.

• 13,862 women religious supported in their apostolate or training

ACN supported the religious formation of 4,416 Sisters and 1,035 novices. We also provided subsistence aid for 3,529 religious Sisters and 2,190 contemplative nuns – not to mention other forms of help.

• 663 means of pastoral transport

This included bicycles, motorcycles, cars and boats. In 2019, as before, most of these were for priests, religious Sisters and catechists engaged in the pastoral and missionary outreach.

Altogether we supported 5,230 projects in 2019, 211 more than in the previous year.

Overall, the number of requests and applications rose slightly (to 7,154) but sadly, over one in four of these projects, or 2,041 in total, had to be declined. The average cost of the projects supported was €14,535. We were able to provide help in 139 countries and 1,162 dioceses – over one-third of all the 3,017 dioceses in the world. We helped over 24,000 catechists and other pastoral workers. And we supplied some 1.7 million Bibles and other religious books in numerous languages, thereby helping millions of people to come to know God better, to pray to him, sing his praises and deepen their personal faith. Once again, this year most of these books and publications went to Latin America and Africa.

24% of the total aid given was for construction projects, followed by emergency aid, particularly for refugees, and support for training and formation.

ACN (UK) Facts and figures

- Income from donations, legacies, and trading £10,286,615.
- Additional £1 million from accrued legacies and other reserves.
- 526 projects supported in 94 countries.
- 8.4% of charity income went on fundraising.
- 82.3% of charity resources applied to aid payments.
- 90.3% of charity resources spent on aid payments and missionrelated communication.

Income from donations, legacies and trading came to £10.3 million. Together with £1 million from legacies accrued previously and other reserves, a total of £11.3 million was available for the work of the charity.

82.3% of charity resources (£8.8 million) was spent directly on aid payments enabling us to support 526 projects in 94 countries. A further 8% was spent on mission-related communication, which included raising the plight of the persecuted and suffering Church at the very highest levels (£0.9 million).

Essential support costs accounted for 5.6% of charity income (£0.5 million), while fundraising costs made up 8.4% (£0.8 million) and trading activities costs a further 2.8% (£0.3 million).


Once again in 2019, legacies accounted for a significant proportion of contributions for support of the Church (£2.4 million or 23.4% of income in 2019). Together with our project partners in the suffering church, we remember those departed benefactors with gratitude.

Standing with the suffering Church

New and dangerous trends are now emerging in Africa. In the north of Nigeria they are already a Church of martyrs and throughout the Sahel region many missionaries and catechists have also paid with their lives. ACN has supported Christians not only in Nigeria but also Cameroon, Burkina Faso and the Democratic Republic of the Congo among other countries.

Asia has seen new threats. In Pakistan and India, religious extremism has struck the lives of Christians. ACN also provided support in Sri Lanka following the 2019 Easter Sunday bombings. Fr Nishantha Cooray came to the UK last October to speak at the launch of ACN's 2019 *Persecuted and Forgotten?* report about his experiences ministering to victims.

In the Middle East we have helped rebuild communities in Iraq and support the most vulnerable in Syria, working with project partners like Sister Annie Demerjian. In Latin America aid has included helping build the Faith in the face of aggresive proselytising by fundamentalist sects.

Through events like #RedWednesday 2019, which included the Foreign and Commonwealth Office being lit up red for the first time, we have stood in solidarity with those suffering for their Faith, drawing attention to those whose plight might otherwise be ignored.
