


On Friday of this week we celebrate the feast day of Our Lady of Fatima, 13th May. Our Lady of Fatima is the patron of our charity and has a special place in our hearts.

We thought it would be helpful to read the story of our Lady of Fatima and colour in the storyboard below.





on May 13, 1917, Lucia dos Santos, a ten-year-old girl, and her cousins Francisco and Jacinta Marto (9 & 7) were herding sheep near their home in Fatima, Portugal. Lucia described seeing a woman 'brighter than the sun, Shedding rays of light clearer and Stronger than a crystal ball, filled with the most sparkling water and lit by burning sunlight'.


It was Mary, the Mother of God, who had appeared to the children, but she didn't tell them who she was yet. She asked them to come back every month for 6 months on the thirteenth day of the month. Mary appeared again on the thirteenth day of each month, asking the children to pray and make sacrifices for sinners.



The Virgin Mary promised a miracle for the last of her visits on october 13, 1917, so that everyone would believe. Crowds of 70,000 came to witness what became 'the Miracle of the Sun'. They all saw the sun 'dance'. While the people were looking at the sun, Lucia, Jacinta and Francisco saw images of the Holy Family along with other holy images of Mary. They said they saw saint Joseph and Jesus bless the people.


The focus of our prayer today is for Peace for the people of Nigeria, especially in the Diocese of Maiduguri, and for families living in camps to escape attacks, and peace in our own lives too.




Activity Create your own Peace Jar

- 1. Find an empty jam jar or other container for this activity. Set aside.
- 2. Take a piece of paper and draw a simple symbol of peace. This could be a heart, a dove or something else which comes to your mind when you think of the word peace. For examples, see below or you might want to do an internet search for "How to draw a dove". Your drawing needs to be quite small (approx. 4cm x 4cm square).
- 3. Cut out your peace symbol.
- 4. Now you have cut out your symbol of peace, fold a piece of paper over several times, so that you can draw around your first image as a template.









- 5. Now you can cut around the second drawing so you have lots of small symbols of peace (ideally at least about 10, depending on how many people you live with).
- 6. Next, make sure your jam jar is clean. Make a sign for your jam jar with your name and the words "Peace Be with You." Use a sticky label for this, or a piece of paper and sticky tape if you do not have a label.
- 7. Give out the peace symbols to the other people in your house (you can share them out equally).
- 8. The rest of your family will give you back a peace symbol every time you bring peace to a situation, act in a peaceful way or resist acting a non-peaceful manner.
- 9. When you get one back, you can decorate it and colour it, or you could ask the person who gave it back to you to sign their name on it.







- 10. Accumilate as many as you can over the next week or month.
- 11. At the end of the allocated time spend some time discussing the activity with your family. Decide ways your household can be more peaceful in the future. Remember to keep praying for peace.
- 12. At this point, you may want to take a piece of string and attach your peace symbols to it and place it somewhere visible, like on your window.

Share food with a friend or sibling
Help to make dinner for your family
Buy an extra item in your food shop and donate it if you can

Give drink to the thirsty

Set up a drinks stand and donate the money you make Give out water on a hot day

Clothe the naked

Clear out your clothes and donate your unneeded clothing Help a younger sibling get dressed Help to do the washing/laundry for your family

Visit the imprisoned

Pray for those who are in prison
Visit a nursing home, or a lonely member of your parish

Shelter the homeless

Donate food or blankets to a homeless shelter Donate to disaster relief services

Visit the sick

Visit a friend or family member in the hospital, or phone them if you are not able to visit

Write letters to residents at your local nursing home

Bury the dead

Pray for those who have died Learn about your ancestors

The focus of our prayer today is Syria. For many years now, families in Syria have had their lives deeply damaged and changed by the effects of war and fighting.

Many families have had to leave their homes behind. Some people's homes have been damaged or even destroyed. Aid to the Church in need have helped thousands of people who have been affected by what has happened.


Darin, is a Mum of five girls, and said: "We have received a lot of help from our neighbours and relatives but, without the financial support of the Church, I don't know what would have become of me and my daughters."

Many families have had to move into temporary accommodation. Although this means that they have somewhere safe to stay, it is not quite the same as being in their own home.



But, we're sure that you all know that it is not just the building that makes up a home, there are many other things too! Things like love, friendship, laughter, kindness, special memories, praying together, sentimental items and even just being together with people you love.

- Get together with the other people in your family/who live with you. Use a large piece of paper to draw the outline of a house.
- Think about all the things that make your house amazingbut here is the catch...not physical items like a TV or a games console. Think about what makes your home feel special, what you enjoy doing together as a family, or what some of the special memories you have together are. You can get some inspiration from the examples above!
- Write or draw these things in or around your house drawing.
 Once you have done this, you can decorate and colour in your house.
- After your house has been completed, take a couple of minutes to say a prayer for the families in Syria who have lost their homes. You could take some time to write something out, or just pray a short prayer out loud.





Alternative activity:

Shepherd's Voice Game

This game helps children and young people understand the importance of listening. Each group of sheep must listen to their shepherd's voice and follow it. The group of sheep will find it easier to get home if they stay together.

Materials Needed:

Blindfolds

Instructions:

- Divide into groups of four or five.
- Designate one person in each group as the shepherd.
- Have the shepherds stand at one end of the play area.
- Have the rest of the groups gather at the other end of the play area. These are the sheep. They should be blindfolded.
- Sheep from the same group may hold hands to keep together.
- The shepherds call their own group of sheep toward them.
- The first group of sheep to gather around their own shepherd wins.

- ·Read Matthew 16:24 Whoever wishes to come after me
- ·Read John 10: 14 I know my own sheep, and my own know me
- ·Read John 2: 5-8 Do whatever he tells you


Today's activity is to pick one of these saints and ask an adult to help you research them. You could look them up online, or find their story in a saint's book.

Activity Make a May Crown for Our Lady_

This May why not get creative with your school class or family and make a crown for Mary with these beautiful hand-made wreaths.



Materials List:

- One pipe cleaner per person (any colour, it will not show)
- Tissue paper in various colours
- Scissors



In your home set up a May Altar to honour Mary. During your Daily Decade of the Rosary, a different family member can crown Mary with their hand-made crown.

As crowns are removed you could link them together to form a garland to hang above your Altar.

Scriptural passage (s) to read and think about:

Luke 2: 46-47

Luke 2:42-52 After searching for three days, Mary and Joseph found Jesus.


Luke 9: 35 – And a voice came out of the cloud, saying, "This is my Son, my Chosen..."






You and your school or family could organise a little May procession through your house or garden during the week beginning 9th May (perhaps on the Feast of Our Lady of Fatima - 13th May).











Instructions:

- 1. Select the coloured tissue paper you would like to use to create your crown. Use scissors to cut tissue paper into two inch squares. (Always use scissors with the permission or supervision of an adult)
- 2. Use the pipe cleaner to pierce a hole in the centre of the tissue square and slide it onto the pipe cleaner.
- 3. Crumple the tissue paper with your hands in order to make it look like a flower.
- 4. Continue to add a further 3 or 4 squares of the same colour, each time crumpling the square.
- 5. Select a new colour of tissue paper and follow steps 2 4.
- 6. Continue to add colours until the pipe cleaner is covered except for the two ends.
- 7. Twist the two ends together and the wrap them around each other to create a smooth circle.
- 8. Spread the flowers out in order to cover the exposed pipe cleaner.
- 9. Your flower wreath is now ready to crown Mary.







You could recite the Maisy Milk Rosary for Peace, sing a hymn to Mary and perhaps finish with the Children's act of Consecration to Our Lady. Family members could finally crown your statue of Mary with their hand-made wreath.
