





"The Catholic Church has a special belief: that every person, no matter who they are or what they believe, is important and should get help when they need it. It's kind of like how we help our friends, even if they're different from us. Imagine if we only helped people who are exactly like us. That wouldn't be very nice, right? Well, the Catholic Church thinks the same way.

They want to help everyone, not just Catholics, because they follow the teachings of Jesus, who told us to love our neighbours as ourselves.

When the Catholic Church helps people, they don't ask, "Are you Catholic?" Instead, they ask, "Are you in need? Are you going through a tough time?" That's because the Church wants to be like a big family that cares about everyone. It's a bit like when we share our toys or help someone who's fallen down, even if we don't know them very well. Helping others, no matter who they are, is how the Catholic Church shows love and kindness in the world. It's a way to make the world a better place, just like how we try to make our homes and schools better by being kind to each other. So, to sum it up, the Catholic Church believes in helping everyone because they believe that's what love and kindness are all about - helping anyone who needs it, just like we'd want help if we were going through a tough time."

Opinion 2 JOHN Aged 32 from LEEDS

"I believe that the Catholic Church should prioritise helping Catholics first. It's a bit like how families take care of their own members before helping others. One reason for my view is that resources, like money and time, are limited. So, I think it's wise to use those resources to assist people who share our faith and beliefs. This can strengthen our Catholic community and preserve our traditions.

I also believe that when Catholics see the Church caring for them, they become more engaged and active in our Church's activities, making our community even stronger.

Additionally, I'm concerned that helping everyone might dilute our Church's identity and values. I want our Church to stay true to its teachings and maintain a strong sense of unity among its members. In my perspective, it's not that the Church doesn't care about others; it's more about taking care of

our own, just like how we ensure our family's well-being before helping outside folks.

However, I understand that not everyone shares this viewpoint. Some believe that the Church's mission is to spread love and kindness to all, regardless of their religion. They think helping everyone is the way to live out Jesus' teachings. Ultimately, it's a matter of perspective, and there are valid arguments on both sides about whether the Catholic Church should primarily help Catholics or extend its assistance to a broader group of people in need."








In this scenario we see how these principles play out in a moral dilemma. Answer the guestions and vote for your preferred resolution to the dilemma with your class.

ENVIRONMENTAL INITIATIVES:

✓ INFRASTRUCTURE:

EVANGELIZATION:

- They're using subsidiarity by speaking up about important issues like violence, land, and disasters. Instead of waiting, they're saying,

DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO

Population: Approximately 89 million people (2021 estimate)

Area: About 2.3 million square kilometers (approx. 0.9 million square miles)

Religion: Predominantly Christian, with a mix of Catholicism and Protestantism, as well as indigenous beliefs.

DEFENDING CONGO'S RESOURCES

The bishops are asking the world to let Congo make its own choices about its land and resources. They're saying that outsiders shouldn't take advantage.

This idea is like subsidiarity, which says that decisions about something should be made by the people closest to it.

BISHOPS RECOMMEND SUBSIDIARITY

Taking Charge During Disasters

- The bishops are also saying that local officials should manage disasters.
- They're upset that recent problems were handled poorly.
- This is subsidiarity in action, where people who understand the area best should fix problems there.

Watching Over Elections

- When it comes to elections, the bishops are pointing out problems with how things are done.
- They're saying that local conditions should be considered.
- This matches subsidiarity, where decisions should fit with the place they're happening.
